"TOUGH" is a word with a variety of connotations that rarely encompass all and so precisely delineates what Blakey represents in the listening room. "TOUGH" denotes his being tough in the jazz world. Blakey is one of the most vital and consistently undiminished jazz musicians of our time. His playing often registers in the waking registers of a disenchanted, graduate and at times agnostically the best and end of a searching listener.
